

Science at Your Fingertips: Become a Citizen Scientist



Do you have a natural love for animals and plants? Are you purely fascinated by the wild world around us? Do you like to hike, hunt, fish, or explore outdoors in your free time? Would you like to help conserve our wildlife. If so, then you could be a citizen scientist.

Scientists don't have to be a biologist or ecologist. They don't have to work for an organization or government agency. Anyone can help with science research as an informal volunteer.

Some animal species are easier to track than others. Some can be tracked by bands or radiometry. Some make appearances or sounds and are easy to collect data on. But some cannot speak for themselves at all. Population data helps determine conservation efforts and wildlife management. Some species may be getting killed by pesticides. Some may be trying to adapt in a new habitat because theirs has been destroyed. Some may be thriving in an unsuspected place. Some are in decline, but some populations are growing.

Citizen science gives a widespread, snapshot view of where species are occurring and how populations are doing.

Citizen science has been around for years. Think of the journals from Lewis & Clark or the writings of Charles Darwin: they were observing what they saw. Today, technology has enabled citizen science to be right at our fingertips. You can choose which type of science you are interested in and download an app to your phone.

As you do your favorite hobbies outdoors, if you notice any particular species, you can open your smartphone or tablet and record your sightings.

Citizen science can be simple and convenient, and is a great way to get involved with a great cause without a huge time commitment. It only takes a matter of seconds to share data that could be used for years. It's a great way to get more eyes on the ground looking out for our natural world.

Citizen Science Apps

Unified Butterfly Recorder (UBR)

Provides butterfly researchers and enthusiasts with a tool to use in the field to efficiently record butterfly sighting data.

eBird

eBird provides rich data sources for basic information on bird abundance and distribution at a variety of spatial and temporal scales. By Audubon Society and Cornell Lab of Ornithology

Project Noah

Project Noah is a worldwide project to document the planet's biodiversity by crowd sourcing photos of animals and plants in your local area.

Leafsnap

Shares data uploaded by users of the location of tree species with images of leaves.

Project Budburst

Collects data on the timing of leafing, flowering, and fruiting of plants throughout the year to help scientists investigate the impact of climate change on different species.

iNaturalist

A tool that lets citizen scientists document their observations of nature. Users can upload photos of plants and animals they observe, add notes, and transmit the location, date, and time of their observation.

Loss of the Night

Users collect data by mapping light pollution and star visibility to help scientists measure and understand the effects of light pollution on health, environment and society.

Meteor Counter

Developed by NASA, users document astronomical magnitudes of meteors observed during meteor showers.



Naturalists lead an annual set of summer camps that allow children to explore and enjoy the great outdoors. The camps are a week-long experience in conservation and nature. Activities may include hiking & outdoor recreation, meeting live animals, story time, nature arts & crafts, picnics, and science activities. Kestrel and Challenge camps will also include an overnight with campfire cooking and a campout.

Parents may register children for camp beginning Wednesday, March 1, 2017 at 8:00 a.m. Registration is limited and on a first-come, first-served basis. To register, come to the Annett Nature Center or call us at (515) 961-6169 (no e-mail registrations will be accepted.) **Camp sessions fill up very quickly.** Because of limited enrollment, children are asked to attend each camp only once.
