Please help us welcome our new Friends of Warren County Conservation Board member- Carla Kuehl-Purdum:

Growing up in Linn County, a love of the natural world was instilled upon me at an early age. My mom would take my brother, two sisters, and me exploring the Cedar River and creekbanks for turtles, frogs, snakes (yup- snakes), and crawdads. (you never forget that pinch of a claw that grabs you before you grab it.) She'd then cook up our catch and we'd have frog legs and crawdads for dinner!

Camping in the summer brought about more discoveries, for the four of us. All kinds of fun-natured mischief along the edges of the campgrounds, like stopping up the nearby creekbed with rocks and watching the water find another route through. The taste of fresh-caught bluegills and sunfish cooked over the open fire with lemon juice and butter was the best, and nothing compared to the taste of watermelon cooled in the waters of the stream. Watermelon seed spitting contests were high competition. Catching fireflies in the dark of night are among my most fond memories. Visiting National Parks and spending week-long trips at our cousin's cabin in Northern Minnesota, we got to expand the love of the natural beauty across the nation and explore even more. Berry picking brought about fresh berries on home-made ice cream. Umm! Umm!



In my later teen years I was able to cross the continental divide in Colorado on backpacking quests. A favorite high school assignment was a botany project. In fact, I had such a passion for collecting leaves and forest flora, I completed my boy friend's project, his brother's, and both my sister's too! As a nature geeking high schooler, I preferred swimming in the local lake and farmer's ponds to the local swimming pool. Riding bike throughout the countryside was and still is a preferred pastime. I even planted a variety of wildflowers from the local woods to my parent's yard. My argument being, you don't have to take of them, they come up by themselves year after year. Now, I'm still involved with native plants and am even beginning to recognize and identify them and understand the importance of bringing them back.



In college I educated myself in Outward Bound and Project Learning Tree at Black Hawk County. As a teacher in Union County, I worked closely with the Conservation Department to have my students experience the outdoors throughout the seasons with hiking excursions, snowshoeing, and building Kestrel houses to be placed along the county roadways.

Recently, signing up for the Forest Therapy Walks offered by our educated naturalists, has been such a grounding, mindful, senses-centered opportunity to hang out with like-minded folks. I highly recommend you try it.

Updates



Annett Nature Center Park Lodge Under Construction

It will be a busy winter on the grounds of the Annett Nature Center Park. After a lengthy planning and bidding period, work is underway on a new, all-season lodge.

The as yet unnamed lodge is being built on the hill south of the ANC wetland. The 84' x 40' structure will feature a 50' X 40' great room with a fireplace and stunning views, a full kitchen, heating and air conditioning, and modern restrooms. Set in restored prairie, the site allows views of the ANC wetland, Lester Pond, and the Annett Nature Center. Footings and the floor are complete. Framing is quickly nearing completion. Electrical, plumbing, septic, and finish work will be starting soon, with work continuing through the winter.

The lodge will be used for Annett Nature Center programming, and will be available for private rentals. Rental fees, and the date when rentals can be booked have not been set. Tentative completion date is Fall 2020, but this is subject to many conditions.

This project was made possible by a very generous donation. The Warren County Conservation Board looks forward to getting to work on the project sections being constructed by staff, and is excited about how this facility will enhance WCCB programming and the public experience at the Annett Nature Center Park. More information on the donation, the name of the facility, when it will be dedicated, and when it will be available for public use will be made available as work continues.
