

# Species Spotlight: Duckweed

Lemna minor

As summer warms up and you start spending more time near freshwater areas, you may or may not have noticed a small green plant floating inconspicuously on the water. These tiny plants are members of the duckweed family, and are the smallest known flowering plants! They are deceptive and fly under the radar because although they are tiny individually, they grow in large groups and can completely cover a body of water!



Duckweed plants are about 2-5 mm long, and has numerous tiny air bubbles imbedded within it allowing it to float on top of the water. A single rootlet develops near the center of I-4 leaves and hangs down into the water. Duckweed thrives on still-moving ponds, lakes, and sloughs. Duckweed is an important food source for aquatic waterfowl, fish, and insects.



Scientists have recently begun to study their rapid growth rate and possible use as bioremediation (the use of either naturally occurring or deliberately introduced microorganisms or other forms of life to consume and break down environmental pollutants) of waterways with large amounts of phosphorus and nitrogen from agricultural runoff. They have found that harvesting duckweed as a crop can remove these polluntants, as well as provide valuable livestock feed and fertilizer. Scientists are even developing techniques to use genetically modified duckweeds to synthesize insulin and other commercially valuable proteins.




## Meet A Member

### 15 Year Exhibit Anniversary



If you have been out to the Annett Nature Center in the last 15 years, you will have noticed our life-sized wire bison sculpture majestically overlooking the prairie near the parking area. Mark Wilson, Co-Director/Operations Coordinator created this symbol of prairies past in 2006. He used barbed and other fencing wire over a metal frame. The structure uses over 1 1/2 miles of wire, cut into over 15,000 pieces that were each welded indivitually to the frame. It weighs over 600 pounds, and is one of the striking pieces that draw many interested eyes and pictures from visitors to the Annett Nature Center!
