


Species Spotlight: Turkey Vulture

Harbingers of Spring. Once you see them slowly circling in the sky, with their dark feathers and bald heads, you know that spring is actually here. While robins have been known to completely over-winter, turkey vultures migrate to warmer winter climates.

Turkey vultures are a beneficial, often over-looked bird that calls lowa home from spring to fall. They are large, dark birds with a bald, red head and a long wingspan of 66–70 inches. They have long, finger-like feathers at their wingtips and hold their wings slightly raised making a 'V.' Turkey vultures can be identified from the soaring flight pattern that they do. They don't flap their wings very often unless they are just taking off and getting to soaring height. They fly in big circular motions, a lot of times riding thermals up to a higher vantage point. (Thermals are columns of rising air.) Turkey vultures may also glide low to the ground sniffing for carrion.

Turkey vultures, which have an incredible sense of smell, are carrion-eaters, or scavengers. Although the initial reaction to eating dead animals is kind of gross, they are important members of the clean up crew. As all of the winter snow, ice, and road kill starts to thaw out, the turkey vultures are there to start eating it and keeping our fields, ditches, and parks clean. Eating dead and decaying carcasses also prevents the spread of diseases and bacteria. They tend to eat the softest bits and organs first, and prefer freshly dead animals but due to their excellent immune system they will also feast on older carcasses without contracting diseases or illnesses.

Turkey vultures are known for their bald heads, but they aren't just aging and losing their "hair." Turkey vultures lack feathers on their head to help keep themselves clean and free of decaying material that could get stuck onto feathers. They will often stick their head completely inside of a carcass. They also commonly excrete their waste onto their legs, on purpose. There are two reasons for this, in warm weather it can help cool them down, and it is highly acidic and kills any bacteria and toxins that might have gotten on their legs while walking on a carcass.

When threatened, a turkey vulture might vomit its powerful stomach acids. This also might mean that if someone startles a turkey vulture on the side of the road and it vomits, it could end up on the car. That can be a stinky way to learn about a defense mechanism! Turkey vultures are really neat, beneficial animals. Be sure to check out some of these unique features the next time you pass a "TV."


Exhibit Update

Warren County Geocaching Constellation Adventure April 1st – November 1st | Warren County

Each constellation cache includes an instruction card, a logbook, and a stack of constellation trading cards. Sign the logbook to show that you found the cache and take a constellation trading card for your collection. Explore the night sky and see if you can spot a constellation.

After finding all 25 caches, take your 25 collectible cards to the Annett Nature Center. We will give you the coordinates to find the last cache challenge. All participants who finish the challenge by November 1, 2021 will receive a finisher's medal and will be added to our Geocaching Adventure Finishers Gallery.
