

Species Spotlight: Compass Plant

(Silphium laciniatum)

The prairies of Iowa have always played a vital role in the ecosystem, providing habitat for various wildlife, including bison, elk, and prairie chickens. The deep root systems of prairie grasses help prevent soil erosion and allow for better water infiltration, making the prairies important in maintaining water quality.

Historically 70-80% of Iowa was covered in tall grass prairie. Our prairies are home to a wide variety of plants such as, big bluestem, switchgrass, and side oats grama, as well as wildflowers such as milkweed, purple prairie clover, and coneflowers. This season we are giving a shout-out to one of our natives, the compass plant.

The compass plant can be identified by several different characteristics. At a striking height of 8 feet this plant towers over many others. It has large deeply cleft leaves, and a thick stalk. Some areas on the plant can appear whitish, this is due to the rough hairs on the stalk and leaves. Bright yellow flowers will be seen blooming from mid to late summer. These flowers can grow up to 2 inches in diameter and have a daisy-like appearance.







Why is it called a compass? This is one of the most fascinating aspects of this plant. The leaves of the compass plant orient themselves to face east and west. Having the leaves face this way limits heat stress on this plant, leaves pointed east and west are less exposed to the sun. This plant's directions have been known to be very reliable, past generations have taken advantage of this and used the plant to orient themselves.

Compass plants provide for the needs of various animals. The seeds provide food for small mammals and birds. Flowers on this plant attract a great deal of pollinators including butterflies and bees. The stem is also home to dozens of insect species. Be on the lookout for this plant the next time you go hiking!





FWCC Donation



We have exciting news here at the nature center! A huge thank you to our Friends of Warren County Conservation for donating an All-Terrian Wheelchair. One of our goals is to make nature accessible to everyone. We believe that everyone should have the opportunity to experience and connect with the beauty and wonder of the outdoors. Our goal is to break down the barriers that often limit access to natural spaces.

This wheelchair has several features that will accommodate citizens with short or long-term mobility limitations. This chair is a mix between a manual wheelchair and a mountain bike. It is lever-driven, which is designed to be about twice as physically efficient as a standard wheelchair. The chair can be operated manually by the user, can be pushed by someone, or both the user and pusher can work together. Hand placement on the levers can affect if the user has more torque for hills, or more speed for flat, smooth surfaces. The wheelchair comes with sand/snow tires and can be used in a variety of terrains and substrates which will encompass our trails very well. This chair can be utilized by younger elementary aged youth as well as adults, with little to no adjustments needed.

As we prepare to make this wheelchair available, we are working closely with our staff and partners to ensure proper training and guidance on its use. Safety measures and protocols will be put in place to ensure the well-being of the users and those assisting them.
