

Creature Feature: Raccoon

Also known as the trash pandas, these animals will be the first to find out you forgot to close your trash can lid. These fluffy bandits can be found in a wide variety of areas including forests, prairies, farm fields and urban areas. Despite them being a sneaky animal, due to the abondance of them it is likely you recognized this animal instantly.

Home: Raccoons will call a variety of places home. A raccoons dwelling is referred to as a den. Which can include tree hollows, ground burrows, abandoned buildings, haystacks and many more.

Diet: These creatures are very adaptable animals, one of the reasons they are able to thrive in different habitats is their diet. They are scavengers and omnivores. They can be found feasting rodents, fish, birds, carrion, fruits, nuts, and of course your week old pizza.





Offspring: Raccoons have between 2 and 5 kits in a litter. Kits are typically born in March and April and stay with their mother for up to a year before leaving. In the wild raccoons life span is up to 3 years, in captivity raccoons can live up to 20 years.

Adaptations: Raccoons' sticky fingers are an excellent adaptation for opening food or trash can lids, climbing, and causing mischief. They are typically nocturnal although they can be seen during the day. To aid them in their night time adventures they have great hearing and vison.

We often think of these animals as a nuisance but their habits are still very useful in our ecosystem. As they aid in distributing seeds and keeping populations down.

Make sure you stop by the nature center to welcome back Ricky the Raccoon! After a long vacation our taxidermy raccoon has finally returned to us.





Grant Nature Land

Grant Nature Land campground expansion is complete, 5 new camping sites have been added, to get 15 sites total. Electric is available at all sites. The biggest addition to the park is a shower house featuring two flush bathrooms and two single shower rooms with a hydrant outside the building. New rock on the campground road has been spread. We are happy to announce that the park is now open for camping! The camping rate is \$20 per night, cash only. Reservations are not accepted, but on a first come first serve basis. Registration is required and is available at the campground entrance. Enjoy your time camping with this 150 acre park in northeast Warren County features a picnic shelter, a secluded pond, and wonderful woodland trails! Turtle Crossing

During the summer turtles are crossing the road to get back home or to another body of water, they often also lay their eggs in the sand on the other side. It is important to watch for turtles while driving and avoid hitting them. If you see a turtle attempting to cross the road, you can help by safely moving it to the other side in the direction it

was headed. Avoid picking up snapping turtles as they have long necks and a powerful bite. Be sure to handle the turtle gently and wash your hands afterward. Letting turtles lay their eggs safely is crucial to the survival of their species.

Iowa's Untouchables

The long wait is over! Summer is here, with the beautiful blue skies, colorful flowers, and bird songs comes some summer plants that we would rather avoid. Here are some common plants that can cause discomfort during the summer season:

Stinging Nettle: Contact with this plant causes itching, burning and swelling.

Poison Ivy: This plant contains a resin called urushiol that causes an itchy rash and blisters on the skin.

Wild Parsnip: When exposed to the sun after touching this plant results in burning and blistering of the skin.

These plants are found in a variety of different habitats and are found all over lowa. Take a close look at these photos of the plants and be sure to have a picture on hand if you ever unsure about a plant. While these plants may make our summer less enjoyable, taking preventive measures can help reduce the risk of discomfort. Wearing protective clothing, and avoiding contact with poisonous plants can help prevent these uncomfortable situations. With proper planning and protection, we can enjoy all that summer has to offer!

Stinging Nettle

Identification: The stem is square shaped with leaves growing opposite and serrated. The plant is covered in small, hair-like structures. Stinging nettle can grow up to 7 feet tall.

Poison Ivy

Identification: Look for the leaves of three characteristic. Leaves are typically shiny green, they may have a small portion of yellow or orange on them as well. Poison ivy also grows as a woody vine with hair that grows up trees.

Wild Parsnip

Identification: Can grow up to 5 feet with flat topped yellow flowers. Leaves on wild parsnip resemble large celery leaves.
