Species Spotlight: Prairie Rose

Rosa pratincole or *Rosa arkansana*

In 1897, the prairie rose was chosen as the official state flower for Iowa (it became North Dakota's state flower in 1907). This rose is a perennial shrub found in a large part of central North America. It's known for its beautiful pink flowers and ability to grow in a variety of habitats, from open meadows to wooded areas. The wild rose is also known for its sweet fragrance and its popularity in gardens and landscaping. With its selection as the state flower, the wild rose has become a beloved symbol of Iowa's natural beauty and agricultural heritage.

The prairie rose has pink flowers with bright yellow stamens that give off a sweet fragrance which attracts bees, butterflies, and birds. Flowers range from 1.5 to 2 inches across with 5 broad petals. The stems typically have 9 to 11 leaflets that alternate, with rounded tips and serrated edges. Its stems are dark green with tiny thorns. The shrub is able to grow up to 3 feet tall.

This hardy plant can withstand harsh weather conditions and thrive in various soil types. Blooming from late spring to early summer, the prairie rose is resistant to drought and fire due to its stout roots. Because of its hardiness, it was one of the few plants that did well during the American "Dust Bowl" in the 1930s.

Rose Hips (fruit)

The rose hips, the fruit of the plant, resemble tiny red apples and are rich in Vitamin C. They were commonly utilized in tea and jams. The petals possess fragrance that can be used for perfumes.

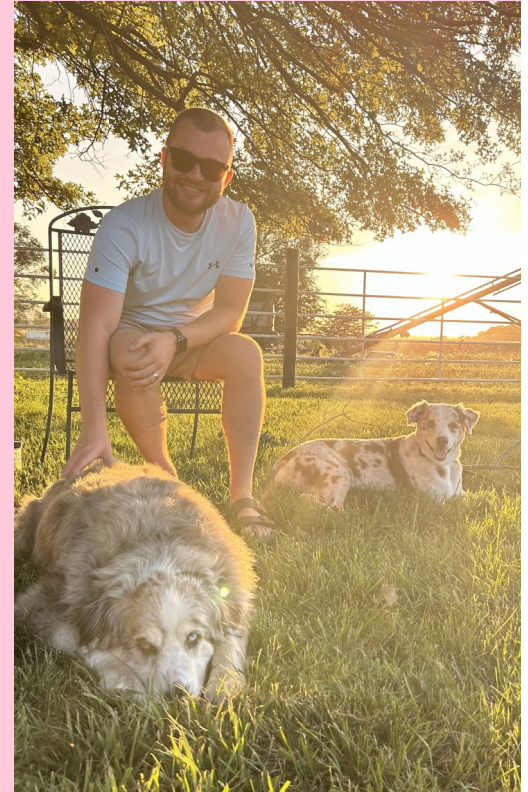
Meet-a-Member

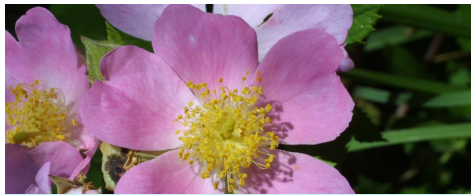

Mitch is excited to be part of the Friends of Warren County Conservation.





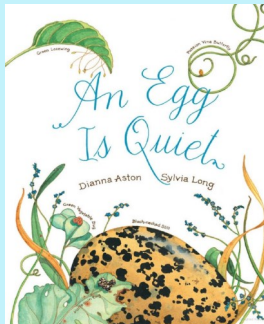

July | Woodland Mounds

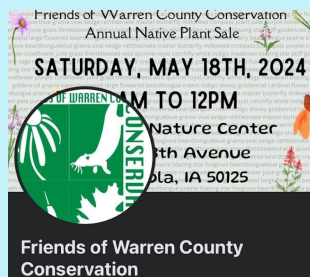
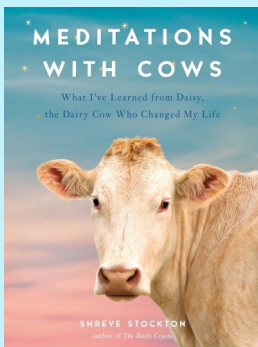

New Exhibits

If you haven't been to the Annett Nature Center yet this spring, we invite you to come out and check out the additions to our exhibit hall! We love our long-standing exhibits like the Insect and Pollinator room, Iowa Prairies and Iowa Woodlands in the exhibit hall, and the live animal floor. However, we are excited to introduce our Iowa Wetlands, common birdfeeder bird panels and seating in the exhibit hall, and Nocturnal Iowa just under the stairs on the Lower Level.

Explore the Iowa Wetland exhibit to discover plants, animals, and animal signs that you can find near wetlands and ponds. Search the wetland display for all the hidden treasures like fish, frogs, tracks, feathers, and more!



Touch the mammal furs, which one is the softest? Which is the prettiest? Can you identify all the furs without looking at the names?

Listen to the sounds of common visitors to birdfeeders. Have you heard those calls at your house? Do you see any of those birds out the large windows?



Head downstairs and look at the beautiful display of artifacts before turning under the stairs to enter an Iowa night! Can you see the animals looking back at you from the dark? Use the flashlights to illuminate the eyes shining back at you. Did you know that different animals' eyes shine different colors?

Nature Untamed



The Secret Lives of Dragonflies

Did you know that dragonflies live longer in their larval stage than in their adult form? Dragonflies lay their eggs in various locations; some prefer to deposit them directly in water, while others choose to lay them on plants near the water. Once the egg hatches, the larva will make its way to the water and start to molt and eat at every chance they get. When in the larval stage, the dragonfly will molt anywhere from 5 to 14 times depending on the species. Sometimes this can take 2-3 months or even up to 5 years in the larval stage before they become adults. When it's time for the larva to molt into a dragonfly, it will crawl out of the water and begin the process of becoming an adult. Once they are adults, they will eat other flying insects such as flies and mosquitoes. Then they will mate, lay eggs, and lastly pass away. The adult dragonfly will live in this stage typically for a week or two, but some species can live in this stage for up to two months.

Graceful and Gazelle-Like

It's about the time of year when you will start to see baby deer running around. Did you know that does are more likely to have twins than one singular fawn? Typically, a doe will have just one fawn her first year and then she will have twins more often than not for the remainder of her life. Sometimes she might even have three or rarely four.

Have you ever wondered why whitetail fawns have spots? These spots act as camouflage to help them evade predators. Fawns are not as fast or agile as adults so when they get scared, they lie down and try to be as still as possible. The spots make it harder for the predators to see them when they are lying in the tall grass or even under trees and brush.

If you ever find a fawn laying the grass, leave them where they are. Their mothers often leave them hidden in foliage while they forage for food, and returning to find their fawn missing can be distressing for them. It's best to observe from a distance and trust that the mother will return to care for her young.
